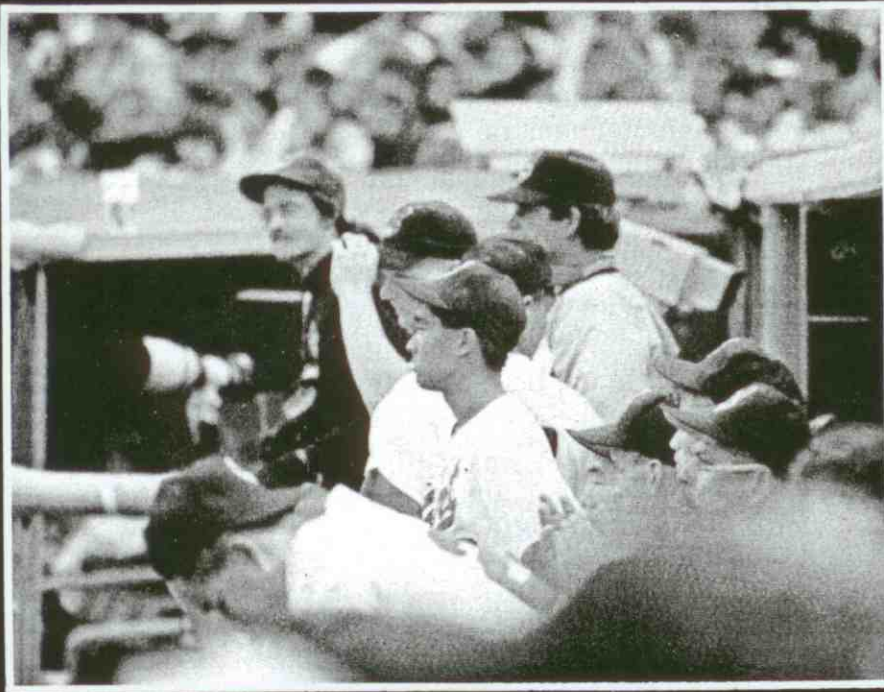

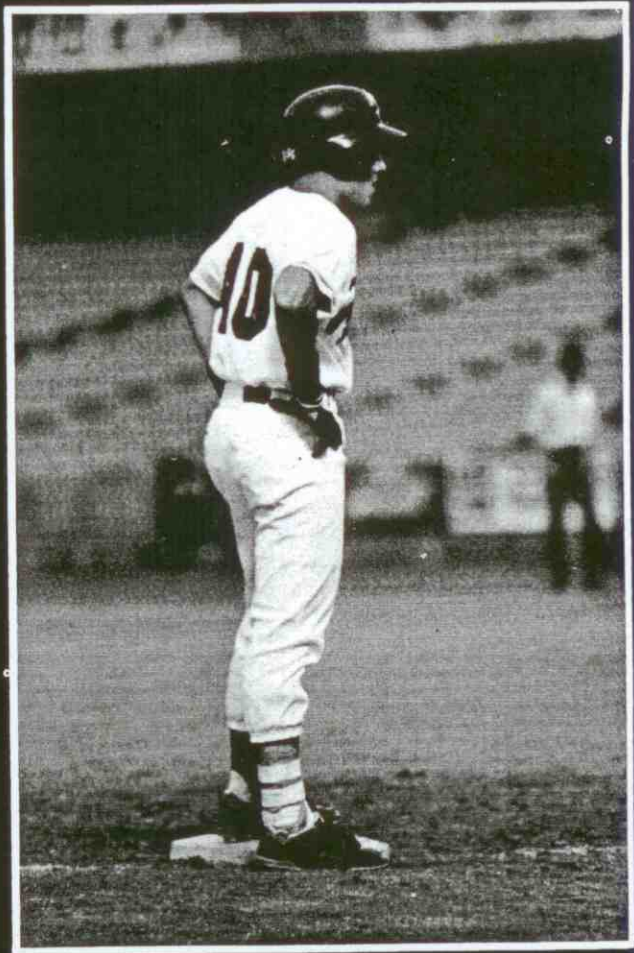

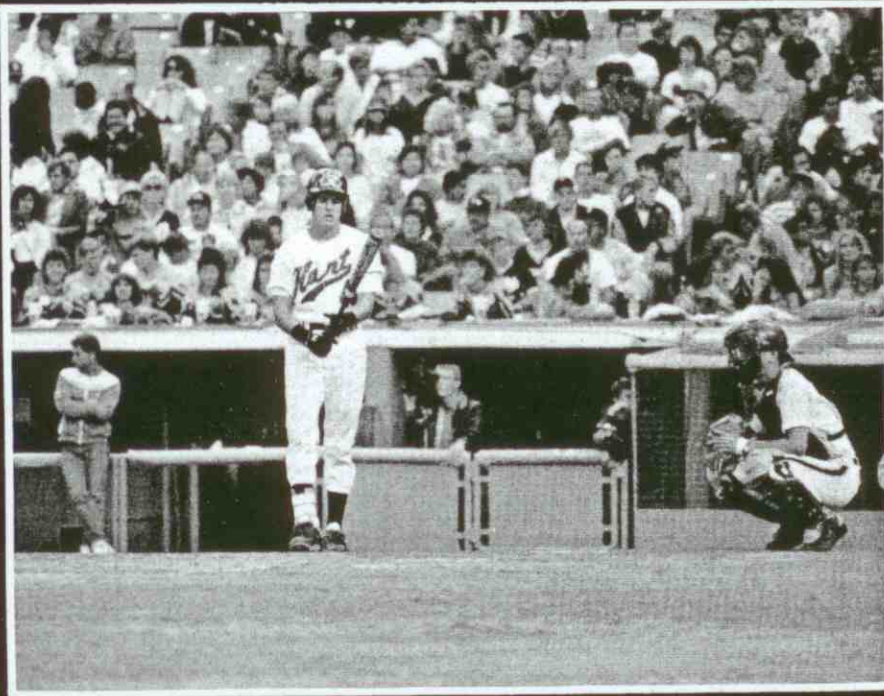

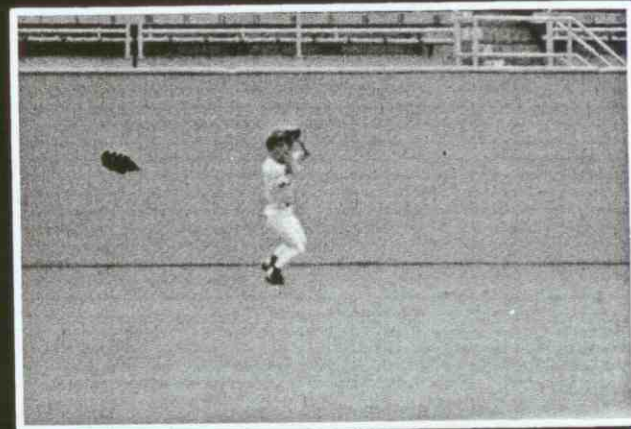

The Road to Dodger Stadium-Hart Baseball 1989

The road to the CIF finals at Dodger Stadium was a long, difficult road.

GAME 1: Hart v. LaSalle, 23-4

Although they trailed 2-0 in the first inning, Hart hammered LaSalle 23-4 behind a 5-6 game by Ray Gardocki, who hit for the cycle. Keith Halcovich won the game pitching 4 innings.

GAME 2: Hart v. Walnut, 10-5

Walnut scored four times in the 2nd inning and led 4-0 until the 5th inning when Hart scored once. They would score four in

the 6th and five in the 7th including a Chris Vasquez homerun, giving them the 10-5 win. Andrew Lorraine struck out 13 and pitched all innings.

GAME 3: Hart v. Buena, 10-7

Hart was playing its 3rd straight homegame and beat the top seed 10-7. Hart used four pitchers as Darrin Tsukashima got the win on the hill. Hart was in the semi-finals.

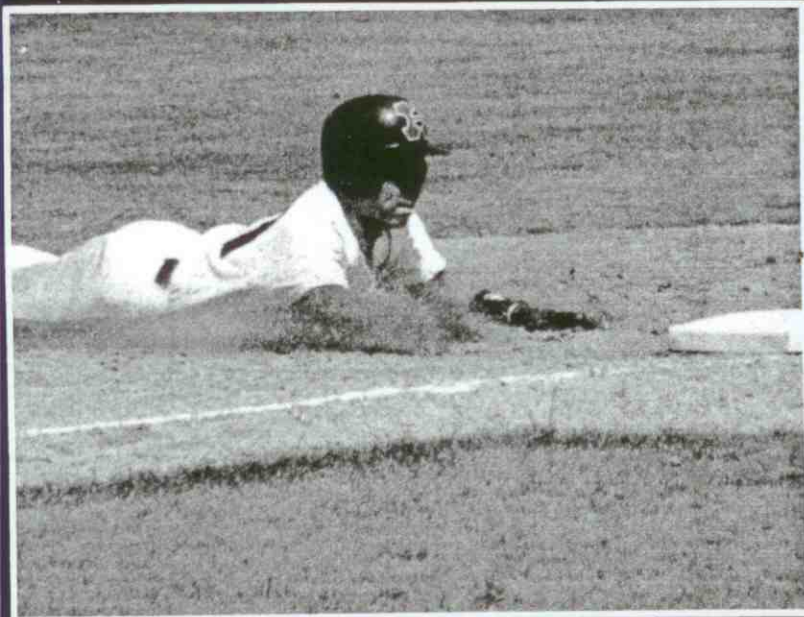
GAME 4: Hart v. South Hills, 14-0

Played in Covina, Hart scored 8 runs before South Hills got an out. South Hills man-

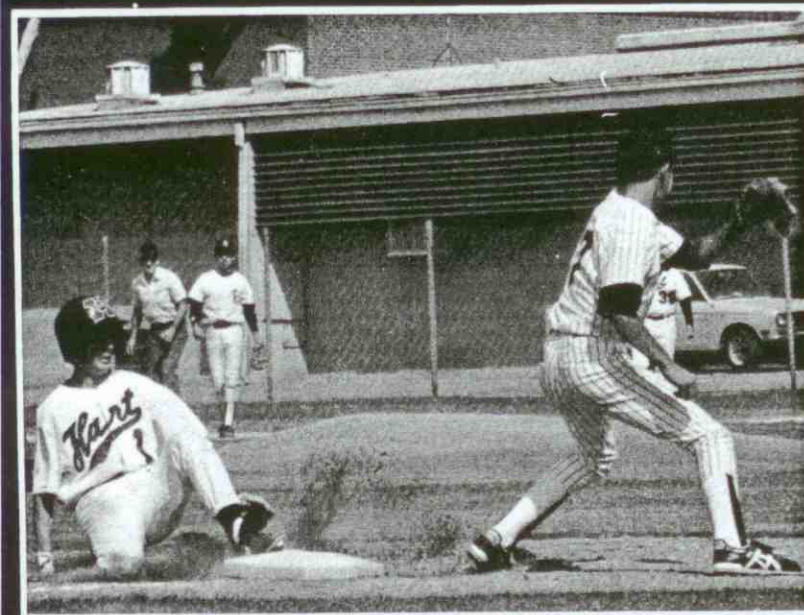
aged just 5 hits off the mound core of Andrew Lorraine and Keith Halcovich. Hart was off to Dodger Stadium.

CIF FINAL at DODGER STADIUM: Hart v. Cerritos, 1-4

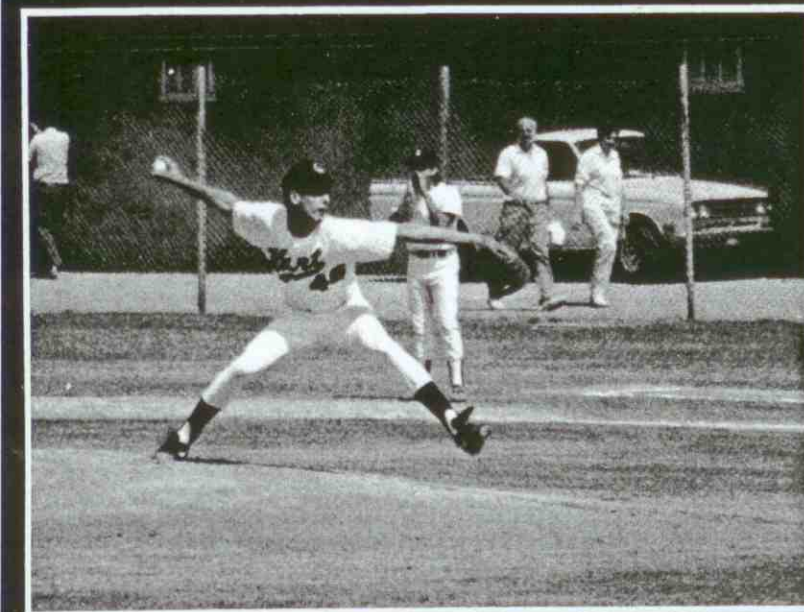

Jay steals it easy

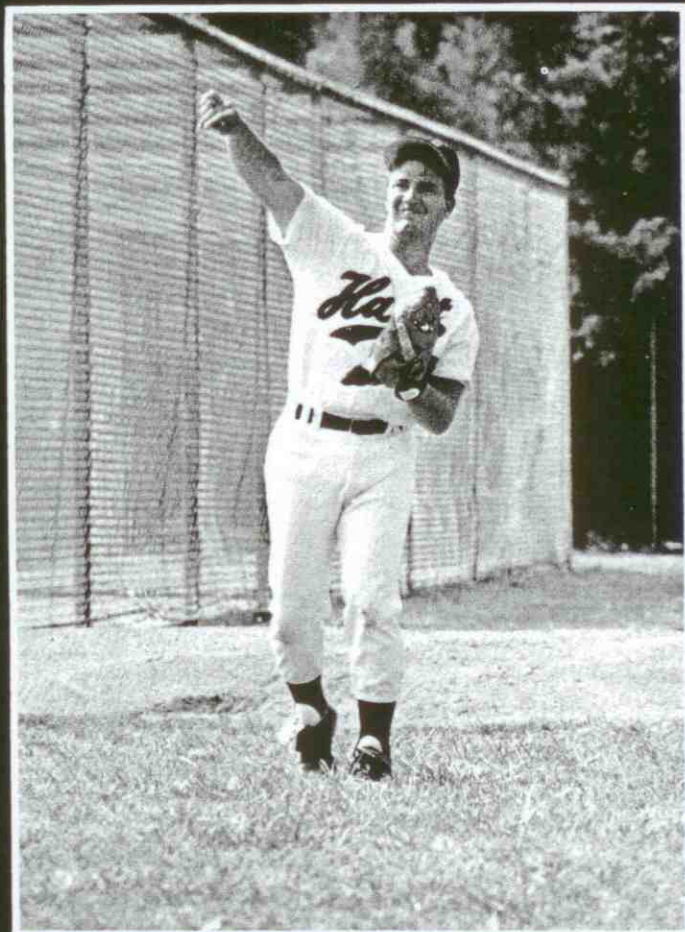


Halco delivers

Last year, Hart coach Bud Murray knew what a great team he would field in 1989. His 1988 team was 26-1, and was returning all but two starters. This team had an amazing season finishing 23-7 overall and 10-5 in league.

One might say the '88 team was better, but nothing could be further from the truth, as one can't measure success and greatness just by wins and losses. This team reached the 4-A championships game in Dodger Stadium in June. How many teams can say that? They were Co-Foothill League champs, and had 12 players on the All-League Team. This was the best team in Hart history.

Their season started out strong with two consecutive wins in the El Segundo Tournament. Although they lost 7-4 to Westminster, they rebounded and took 5th in the tourney. After trouncing Canyon 9-2, they played the most controversial game of the year which eventually cost them the league crown. They trailed Alhambra 3-2 with the winning run at the plate. Alhambra had been late arriving. When it was too dark to play, the game was called with the winning run at the plate. The team played in the Cowboy Classic in Las Vegas where they had no competition, and won the Classic with a total of 45 runs scored in four games. All four other league games lost were by a total of 5 runs. In the end, after an eighth-inning 2-1 loss to San Gabriel, they settled for a league tie. The team was led by seniors Casey Burrill, who led the team in hitting, Ray Gardocki (1st base), Dave Toledo, Darrin Tsukashima, Jay Sanford, Chris Vasquez, and Jason Edwards. Shortstop Rob Davis and Lance Migita (left field), both juniors, led the team as well as the emergence of the underclassmen pitching staff of Andrew Lorraine and Keith Halcovich. All were All-League selections as well as junior Chad Miyata.
